VISITOR ATTRACTIONS

The Belle of Louisville, the oldest of six authentic river steamboats still in operation, was built in 1914. Her newer, smaller sister ship, the **Spirit of Jefferson**, was built in 1963 and plied the Mississippi River before coming to Jefferson County in 1995. Churchill Downs: Horse racing in Kentucky is rich in history, dating back to 1789 when the first race course was laid out in Lexington. However, it was almost 100 years later, in 1875, that Churchill Downs officially opened and began its tradition as "Home of the Kentucky Derby." Its slogan is "the greatest two minutes in sports." Locust Grove: This 1790s Georgian mansion and National Historic Landmark served as the last home of General George Rogers Clark, Revolutionary War hero and founder of Louisville, KY. Today the site includes several reconstructed supporting farm buildings, formal quadrant gardens, cutting gardens and an herb garden. The home is furnished with some of the finest examples of Kentucky crafted furnishings, as well as portraits and select furnishings belonging to the family.
